Curator biography:

Toufik Douib is an independent curator and event director. His multidisciplinary practice focuses on the question of Algerian-Maghrebi identities through eclectic contemporary lenses, bridging with Diaspora artists and across the eastern and western creative scene.

After completing a Masters in cultural events management, Toufik curated in 2015 his first exhibition 'Algerianism'. This followed three distinct collaborations with the P21 Gallery (2017-2018): solo exhibition 'Dhikr Pictural', series of short movie screening '{Un}Told Stories' and critically acclaimed visual group show 'Pop Art from North Africa', which has since been presented in Spain (2019-2020).

Toufik was also commissioned on two occasions by Shubbak Festival, UK's largest festival dedicated to MENA culture: through 'Belonging Sideways' — a multimedia exhibition on the theme of territory and identity and, last year, with 'Soundclash' gender-binding experience of politically charged sound and visuals.

Other cultural ventures include the artistic research project "Generation Independence" for Portsmouth University and coordination of 'DIGI-MENA' online mapping research platform.

Portfolio of selected projects and collaborations:

2015: Algerianism:



The word 'Algerianism' was initially describing a literary movement constituted in the early twentieth century by a group of French and Algerian intellectuals, who aimed to build a cultural ideology to reunite both settler and native communities. But after the independence, the notion of Algerianism was taken by Algerian thinkers into a more nationalist and patriotic reference.

This exhibition is a visual collaboration with French Pied-Noir artist, Patrick Altes, bringing a reflective on Algeria's emergent art scene on what the concept of Algerianism would mean today.

• 2016: Home-Lend (ARTifariti):



'Home-Lend' seeks to engage into a full dialogue on the percept of occupation and belonging; at a time of decolonization's inspect and refugees' crisis, the idea is to break those stereotypes as well as the geographical boundaries and ultimately help define a new notion of identity and nationalism while referencing the themes of memory and filiations. The virtual exhibition was commissioned for the 10th anniversary of 'Artifariti', a human rights residency project supporting Western Sahara through art.

2017: Pop Art North Africa - part I (London):



'Pop Art from North Africa' brings together for the first time the artworks of fifteen creative individuals and artists from North Africa, all inspired by the Pop Art movement.

Through paintings, digitally manipulated images, animation, music and street art, the show will take the audience on a voyage through urban landscapes, exploring the Maghreb's human condition while indicating the tortuous clash between tradition and modernity, in homage to the pioneers of the Western pop art, such as Keith Haring, Andy Warhol, and Roy Lichtenstein.

• 2017: Dhikr Pictural:



Dhikr Pictural inspires to reconnect truthfully with the Self and look beyond the unknown to reach out for what is divine. This spiritually-charged show offered a rich programme of events, including talks, performances and workshops.

• 2018: Untold Stories:

• 2021: Soundclash (Online):

Living through revolutions, uprisings, protests and activist movements has been a seminal experience for most young people in North Africa. Each life is personal and different, each country specific, but the explosive atmosphere of the last 10 years has led to the birth of a new breed of musicians who boldly combine electronica, Dj-ing and visuals with irreverent politics.



Fusing Arabian mixtapes with Maghrebi anthems, graphics and stroboscopic effects, Soundclash is a genre-bending experience from North Africa of new sound and visuals with a political conviction. Soundclash marked the curator's second collaboration with Shubbak Festival.

2021: Exist, Resist, Repeat (Hilbertraum Gallery, Berlin):



This exhibition was imagined as a visual diary that pays tribute to some of the artists, initiatives that the curator have worked or connected with during the 'Covid Era'. 'Exist, Resist, Repeat' aspires to bring a nuanced vision to the quest for art in resistance and celebration of the first almost normal audience-setting exhibition in two years.

This event was a vibrant homage to Turkish symbolist artist *Ahmet Talha Gurol* (work in display) who passed away a few weeks before the show opened.

Curator coordinator for *DIGI-MENA*, an online research platform that aims to source and connect digital artists from the digital art scene working within the Middle East and North Africa & Diaspora. Project founded by Out of the Circle Cairo.
